FEELS ART PROMPTS

F for FIRST IMPRESSIONS: (2 Minutes)

What stands out to you? If you imagine you are the child, how are you feeling? Can you imagine any smells, sounds, or lighting accompanying the scene?

E for EXAMINE DETAILS: (5 Minutes)

What do you notice about the details of the faces? Are the eyes open or closed? How would you describe the figures' facial expressions? What do you notice about the hands and the feet? Why do you think the mother is barefoot? Why is the mother seated? What is she wearing?

What can you tell about the surroundings? How many different shades of blue do you see?

E for EXPLORE YOUR RESPONSES: Does Picasso's portrait of a mother and child resonate with you? How do you feel observing Picasso's painting? What helps you feel better when you are feel down or blue? Do you like to be hugged? As a child, do you remember being hugged by your parent or another adult?

L for LEARN ABOUT CONTEXT: (10-15 minutes. Feel free to write down your responses or discuss them with others.) Picasso was about 20 years old when he produced a series of works between 1901 and 1904 in a range of blues. The works from this period of his career became known as his "Blue Period." He had recently suffered the death of his sister, and his close friend, Carles Casagemas. Pursuing his career in Paris away from his family in Madrid, he was poor and empathized with those also suffering from poverty.

S for SHARE YOUR FEELINGS: (15 Minutes or more. Feel free to write down or discuss your responses with others.)

In Fyodor Dostoyevsky's *The Brothers Karamazov* (1879-1880), the author writes that only a beautiful childhood memory can save us:

"You must know that there is nothing higher and stronger and more wholesome and good for life in the future than some good memory, especially a memory of childhood, of home. People talk to you a great deal about your education, but some good, sacred memory, preserved from childhood, is perhaps the best education. If a man carries many such memories with him into life, he is safe to the end of his days, and if one has only one good memory left in one's heart, even that may sometimes be the means of saving us."
